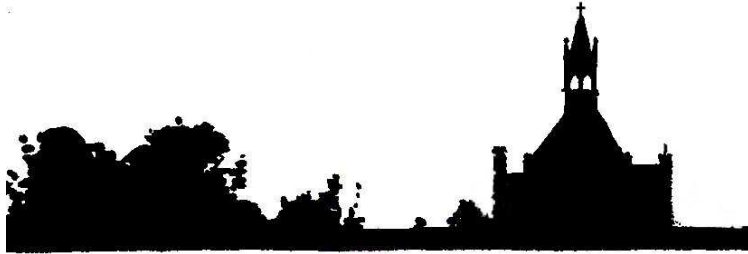

Happy birthday ECPT : 1995-2005!

This year, Ellerton Church Preservation Trust is ten years old, and what a rewarding and creative ten years it has been. After years of negotiation with the Church authorities (and within weeks of possible demolition) the ECPT was established in 1995 to take into protective ownership and to conserve Ellerton Priory church, a key element in the cultural landscape of the internationally important Lower Derwent Valley. However, the seeds were sown many years before. In the 1980s Keith Barley, the craftsmen glazier who has now worked on every window in the restored church, tried to acquire it as his workshop, but was thwarted by bureaucracy. The present writer was first taken to see the abandoned and completely derelict building on a bitterly cold day in the winter of 1991-92 by Stephen Warburton, who enthused me and many others with his belief that something could - and must - be done to save it. Stephen became the first Secretary of the Trust, and until his sudden death early last year, was the real engine of the whole enterprise.

The history of the Trust can be told on another occasion. It is enough to say here that it has achieved all that the original trustees and their loyal supporters set out to do - and far more. This year we host our richest programme of events and activities to date (see overleaf), and in August baby Josephine Marr - whose family now live in the former vicarage - will be baptised in the restored Ellerton Priory church. There could hardly be a more fitting way to celebrate than that!

CPRE Mark 2005

And there could be few better ways to 'mark' our anniversary year than to discover that we have been awarded the CPRE Mark for 2005. This is the most prestigious national honour awarded by the Campaign to Protect Rural England, which was founded in 1926, and is one of the longest established and most respected environmental organisations. The CPRE Mark is given in recognition of excellence, value and long-term benefit in rural conservation schemes in England

We certainly believe that our project at Ellerton shares all of those virtues, but we couldn't be more thrilled or surprised to receive such a wonderful, high-profile vote of confidence in our work. The award will be made at Ellerton on 12th June by the East Riding branch of the organisation "... *in recognition of the work of the Ellerton Church Preservation Trust in restoring this Priory church and churchyard as a positive and lasting contribution to the conservation and enhancement of the character, distinctiveness and diversity of the Lower Derwent Valley.*"

Ann Roberts (1942-2004)

Every visitor to one of our Heritage Open Days over the last few years will have met Ann Roberts, though they may not easily recall this unassuming woman who avoided the lime-light and was always happiest working away quietly in the background. Ann was the partner of Reg Thomas, the skilful brick-layer who has re-built much of the churchyard wall. Although she did not live locally, Ann was devoted to Ellerton, where she made many good friends, and she often travelled all the way from her home near Chester to help the ECPT with its work. She sold cards and gifts on open days, cheerfully donated her beautiful needlework and tirelessly re-pointed much of the churchyard wall - every now and again stopping, trowel in hand and face beaming, to listen to the curlews piping their magic above the ings.

Tragically, Ann fell ill last October and died only five weeks after being diagnosed with a rare leukaemia. The trustees agreed that she should have a memorial at Ellerton, and Reg Thomas commissioned the sculptor and letter-cutter Charles Gurrey to carve a plaque. Ann was Welsh, so her memorial is made of beautiful dark blue-grey Welsh slate with delicately coloured lettering, and is placed in the quiet corner behind the church door - very discreetly, as befits the lady herself.
